Between its 1773 charter as the "Alexandria Addition" and the present, New London has grown in overlapping stages: settlement, agriculture, recreation, retirement, commuting and remote work have successively shaped the town's population and development. These stages, related to advances in transportation and technology, appear clearly on residential maps, but they are also reflected in photographs, newspaper accounts, town reports, business records and personal papers.

This survey course blends formal history lectures and informal conversations with special guests: Sarah Galligan (early New Hampshire history), Nancy Dutton (Lake Sunapee Resorts), John Tilley (YMCA and camping), Laurie Lauridsen (King Ridge Ski Area), Adam Ricker (Zoning and Planning) and others.
